Back in November 2019, we reviewed the first models to come from Velasor, the Austro-Daimler "Sascha" cars and we were blown away by the incredible detail, care and presentation of these models. As soon as Ramón Cubiró got in touch to tell us about the third release in the Velasor range, we knew what to expect – and it's all here.

ere. The new models are of the Type 13

Bugattis that swept to a resounding

1-2-3-4 victory at the 1921 Italian Grand Prix Volturette event, ahead of the OM team that came from Brescia itself. In honour of the victory, the Type 13 cars were thereafter known as the "Brescia" Bugattis.

The detail is again astounding: moving front and rear shock absorbers and springs, movable steering arm, opening bonnet and straps, movable exterior levers, full engine detail (of course), removable fuel tank cap, cabling and piping in abundance – the list goes on. And on. All four team cars are available individually or as a set and, for the completists out there, there's also the unnumbered car that didn't start the race. As we found with the "Sascha" cars, the level of modelling is again of the highest calibre, with the driver and mechanic figures being individually modelled on the real crews. Now we all know that there will be someone out there for whom all that detail simply won't be enough. They've thought of that. There's a "Signature" specification

also available, built by Ramón himself, where you can have a movable accelerator pedal that, by means of a system of levers, operates complexity. There's also a version of the carburettor butterfly and there's a steering wheel built up from stainless steel and riveted cedar wood "Signature" versions are €860 each rings, with a ceramic varnish finish.

All of this amazing work doesn't come cheaply, so you might like to be sitting down while I go through the prices... With each car you have a display option, of either a classy wood plinth or a detailed diorama.

The basic setup costs €660, while your diorama versions will set you back \in 760 – \in 820, according to the winning car with a driver figure and replica trophy for €920. The and finally, the five-car set is \in 3,200. Oh, hold on, there's a diorama version of that too, for €4300... So, something for everyone, then!
